The monitoring report shows a current variance of £8,432 underspend against budget.

- The Administration & Overheads having revalued JBC properties for insurance purposes last year, this Committee was able to put its Insurance out to tender for the 2019/20 financial year which resulted in savings of £1,100. The new contract is a three year contract.
- Eashing Cemetery we have had a large number of grave purchases this quarter which are always difficult to predict.
- Nightingale Cemetery we do not budget for any revenue at Nightingale as it has limited availability (until our digitising work is complete), so all revenue is treated as a windfall.
- Nightingale Lodge this Committee did some garden clearance works at the Lodge to ensure the Cemetery aspect was maintained.

10. RE-WILDING – EASHING CEMETERY – ITEM FOR DECISION

Recommendation: Members to resolve to approve:

- 1. The reduction of laurel trees adjacent to the Ockford Ridge Site B and the areas around the Old Garden of Remembrance.
- 2. The creation of wildflower meadows within Eashing Cemetery.

Introduction: The proposal below would form part of Waverley Borough Council's (WBC) Community Benefit Programme (CBP) with its appointed contractor for site B (21-34) Ockford Ridge. Construction works for this site are planned to start in autumn next year, at which time WBC and its contractor will commence such community projects, to run over the duration of the main construction programme.

The CBP has been initiated on the estate with site A, to exploit the investment focus of house-building in the community so that local residents and stakeholders can enjoy some wider benefits from WBC's investment, through its build contractor. With site A, this has enabled, amongst other initiatives, maintenance work to be carried out on the Scout and Guide building and St Marks Community Centre.

The CBP is intended as an ongoing partnership between WBC, its contractors and the communities in which it delivers new, affordable housing. The wildflower meadow scheme and re-wilding at Eashing Cemetery reflects an ideal opportunity for WBC to work with the Godalming Joint Burial Committee as a new stakeholder in an appropriate location and for specific, relevant needs.

Background: Currently the swards surrounding the formal burial areas of Eashing Cemetery consist mainly of wild grass with areas of bracken and brambles towards the outer boundaries. Whilst in the earlier years of the cemetery, when this area formed the majority of the land, the wild grasses did provide a hay crop, which a local farmer would purchase, in recent years the reduced area has made this an uneconomical process. As such, the twice yearly cutting and removal of the wild grasses has been at the Joint Burial Committee's expense.

With this area no longer forming part of the economic model of the cemetery operation, Members are requested to consider the proposal put forward in collaboration with the Housing Development Team of WBC.

Proposal: The redevelopment of site B (21-34) Ockford Ridge, adjoins Eashing Cemetery boundary and provides a great opportunity for new social housing and the enhancement of the local habitat and its biodiversity. Whilst onsite enhancements will provide some biodiversity, concerns remain regarding a biodiversity deficit.

To address this deficiency and the limited scope on site to add a wider range of plants, it is proposed to create a wildflower meadow over the site boundary, in Eashing cemetery, all within 100m of the site and the estate.

The outline proposal and a map of the areas to be considered for the creation of wildflower meadows are attached for the information of Members. Whilst the area adjacent to site B extends to approximately 2 acres, the wider scheme would see an area of up to 6 acres within the cemetery being converted from grass to wildflower meadow.

In considering this proposal, Members will wish to note that the creation of wildflower meadows around the boundary of Eashing Cemetery will not impact on the operation of the formal burial areas, but will it is believed, greatly enhance the visual appearance, whilst adding to the ambience of peace and tranquillity that already exists within the cemetery grounds.

Of the current unused burial land within the cemetery, an estimated 35 year supply would become wildflower meadow. Although under current burial management models this area would eventually be returned to provide for future burial ground needs, grounds maintenance practices, such as those adopted at Nightingale Cemetery, could see the older parts of the 'formal' burial ground being re-designated as wildflower areas, hence maintaining the overall level of land providing a habitat for pollinating insects and other invertebrates.

Costs: The main cost of creating wildflower meadows lies in the preparation of the ground. Whilst it is anticipated that an initial contribution to the cost of the establishing works would be forthcoming via WBC, the future maintenance and upkeep costs would lie with the Joint Burial Committee. However, it is expected that in the longer term, maintenance costs of the wildflower meadows would be in line with the current costs of managing the existing grass areas within the cemetery.

As part of the overall proposal, WBC would also be removing/reducing the larger parts of the laurel hedging along the Ockford Ridge boundary and around the old Garden of Remembrance so that, as in other areas of the cemetery, a more bio-diverse flora and fauna can be established in its place. The cost of this work to be borne by WBC.

Educational Benefit: Subject to further discussions, if Members agree to the project, the Eashing Cemetery wildflower meadow project could provide a suitable site for the Centre of Environmental Engineering and Conservation of the University of Surrey graduate students to use for research and dissertation projects.

From this it is hoped that educational opportunities could also be make available to local schools and colleges.

11. GARDEN OF REMEMBRANCE – ITEM FOR DECISION

Recommendation: Members to resolve to approve:

- 1. The reduction of hedging around the Garden of Remembrance in order to provide a more open and pleasant vista.
- 2. The repair and repainting of the Garden of Remembrance boundary railings.
- 3. The allocation of £2,500 from the cemetery reserve as a contingency for the completion of the works.

Members will be aware from their previous site visit that to create an increased biodiverse environment and to open the vista of the old Garden of Remembrance (GoR) which, in turn would make it a more pleasant place to visit, it is proposed to remove the laurels surrounding the GoR and to reduce the height of the hedging facing onto Franklyn Road. Whilst, as set out in the previous agenda item, the removal of the laurels would form part of the JBC and WBC biodiversity scheme, the reduction of other hedges surrounding the GoR would be a JBC responsibility.

If Members agree to this scheme, the reduction of the hedges would take place between September and March to avoid the main breeding season for nesting birds. It is anticipated that the proposed height reduction of the beech, privet and thorn hedges will be contained within the overall grounds maintenance budget of Eashing Cemetery.

On inspecting those areas of the railings that can be seen through the existing hedges, the boundary railings appear to be in a fairly good condition, however, a fuller appreciation of the condition of the railings will only be available once the hedges are reduced. As such, in order for any repairs to be carried out before the start of the breeding season, Members are requested to resolve to approve the virement of up to £2,500 from the Cemeteries Maintenance Reserve, which currently stands at £60,883, as a contingency fund to support the completion of the works.

12. <u>CEMETERY GROUNDS MAINTENANCE - SCHEDULES & EQUIPMENT - ITEM FOR</u> **DECISION**

Recommendation: Members to resolve to approve that:

- 1. Up to £10,000 be allocated from the revenue reserve for the provision of grounds maintenance equipment.
- 2. Revised maintenance schedules are submitted to this committee for approval prior to seeking appropriate contractors.

With the engaging of a directly employed maintenance workforce, the possibility of re-wilding areas of land, thus altering the ground's maintenance regime, together with other changes to the management of the cemeteries made since the last review of the cemeteries grounds maintenance schedules, an opportunity exists to re-evaluate the grounds maintenance requirements with an aim of reducing external contractor support to two core functions, high volume grass cutting and grave digging.

Likewise, a number of maintenance operations previously undertaken by ad-hoc contractors will now be undertaken in-house. These include: ashes plot interment preparations, memorial maintenance and inspections, cemetery maintenance (chapels), Nightingale Memorial Garden maintenance, grave levelling and cemetery boundary maintenance.

In order to maximise the benefits available through appropriate task allocation between external contractors and in-house maintenance operatives, which would enable effective and efficient use of resource, some general grounds maintenance equipment, including the provision of a suitable utility tractor will be required.

Whilst the exact equipment requirement that would enable the transfer of non-specialist operations from external contractors to in-house provision is yet to be finalised, in order to be able to implement the operational changes as efficiently as possible, which will allow for the implementation of revised external contractor specifications for 2020/2021, Members are requested to resolve to approve an expenditure of up to £10,000 for the purchase of maintenance equipment to be funded from the revenue reserve which currently stands at £40,427.

13. RBS CEMETERY RECORD SYSTEM – DATA ENTRY – ITEM FOR NOTE

Data entry of the historic burial records is continuing to progress, to date 20 August 2019:

Nightingale Cemetery 3719/5587 interment records have been entered into RBS system; Eashing Cemetery 976/8007 interment records have been entered into the RBS system.

Nightingale Cemetery remains the priority and it is hoped that the data entry will be completed within the next 4 week. Completion of the data entry will, subject to staff resource capacity, enable the second stage of the project to begin. The second stage will link each record with a map location thus allowing identification of the groups of differing classes of graves i.e. common, private, unused etc.

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Background

The redevelopment of site B (21-34) Ockford Ridge, Godalming presents a great opportunity for new social housing *and* the enhancement of the local habitat and its biodiversity: we are planning single statement trees in between parking spaces together with suitable hedging and shrub species to improve what is currently suburban gardens with limited biodiversity.

To address this deficiency and the limited scope on site to add a wider range of plants, it is proposed to create a wildflower meadow over the site boundary, in Eashing cemetery, all within 100m of the site and the estate.

Eashing Cemetery is managed by Godalming Joint Burial Committee (GJBC) on behalf of Godalming Town Council and Busbridge Parish Council.

Proposals in outline

Currently, an area of sward runs around three sides of the cemetery, beyond the formal graves' area. It is proposed to return some of this area to wildflower meadows. The following reflects recent discussions on this joint borough and town council initiative. The initial phase of re-wilding would include two principle areas on

opposite sides of the Cemetery, shown shaded in yellow on the aerial photograph below.

As part of the monitoring, undergraduates from Surrey University would be invited under supervision to record and monitor the gradual transformation of these wild flower meadows. The detail of this aspect of the initiative has not yet been worked out.

- 1. The reduction of the sward using a small flock of sheep, brought in under the supervision of the GJBC, to graze down the vegetation over the next few months. Periodic grazing would be required to maintain a balanced, wildflower-friendly habitat with an end-of-year cutting and removal of mowings: the town council supports this approach as it meets the spirit of their environmental commitments
- 2. Seeding / cultivation would be minimal with some additional species introduced through small-scale turf removal in places.
- 3. The cemetery's Garden of Remembrance is also under review for improvement laurel hedge reduction, semi-formal border planting and some small scale hard landscaping (paths). As part of the building contractor's community benefit works, it is proposed to include this small project as part of the wildflower meadow scheme.
- 4. There is a relatively dense and in places high, mainly laurel tree border between the proposed wildflower area and site B. In principle agreement has been reached between Waverley and the GJBC for the reduction of some of these higher laurel specimens, in order to remove overshadowing trees on the boundary. These works would form part of the Eashing Cemetery scheme

Long term maintenance and benefits

Once created, both the wildflower meadow and the Garden of Remembrance would be managed and maintained by the GJBC, as an amenity and educational resource in equal measure, to complement the cemetery's formal burial ceremonies. Such benefits would accrue to the local community. The GJBC fully supports a sustainable approach to the works.



Timetable and costs

Grazing, once made safe and secure by fencing, could commence in the near future once appropriate management regimes have been put in place. This would allow natural seeding and the start of the wildflower germination process to start with overwintering of seed leading to the first flush of spring flowers (heartsease, cowslip and primroses) followed by the majority of species flowering in summer (cow parsley, cornflower, nettles, yellowwort and vipers bugloss) with autumn species (toadflax, poppy, thistles and harebell) completing the annual flowering. Some species are perennial and some bi-annual.

Whilst further investigations and enquiries are required regarding the ability to graze the cemetery meadows, it is hoped that, once established, it would be cost-neutral

to the GJBC. An initial cost for fencing off the meadow areas is estimated to be £500 - £750

Seeded turves can be widely purchased from various suppliers – often at a discount rate for local councils. The once-a-year cut would also be 'free' with the farmer removing the valuable mowings for his own use. This is a necessary [part of the management regime, since it prevents fertilisation and enrichment of the soil and therefore restrict the growth of grasses that can overwhelm wildflowers.


Sponsorship might be considered – the build contractor for site B is a natural candidate.

Benefits

A wide variety of benefits would come from this project, to community and conservation stakeholders. These would include:

- Enhanced biodiversity and local habitat, with increased pollinator plants and greater insects and bird activity as a consequence
- An amenity and educational resource for the cemetery and the local community, including conservation, school and resident (gardening) groups, offering an open-air demonstration meadow that is easily accessible or all ages / interests
- Carbon-capture measures to help offset climate change pollutants for the local environment
